Fall 2016: SHARE Center will open November 2016




Student Survey Data

 - Palo Alto College was awarded Project Impacto in August 2016
 - \$525,000 a year
 - 5 year project
 - \$2.62 million total award
 - 6 full-time; 9 part-time positions
 - Project Director, Coordinator Student Success, Data Analyst, Senior Advisors, Sr. Multimedia Specialist; Tutors, Peer Advisors



S.H.A.R.E Center and Project Impacto

Project Impacto will establish college wide best practices and support systems that enable high-need students to successfully enter, persist, and complete an associates degree program by:

- 1. Strengthening high impact practices for continuing students to improve student persistence and completion.
- 2. Establishing a Student Advocacy Center at Palo Alto College to improve overall rates of students success
 - support for S.H.A.R.E. center, including financial literacy and career planning, and renovation of student center space
- 3. Increasing professional development opportunities for faculty and staff that will improve student engagement, teaching and learning
