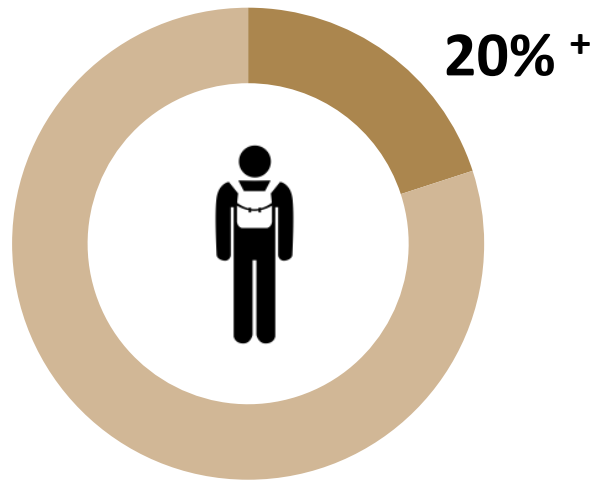

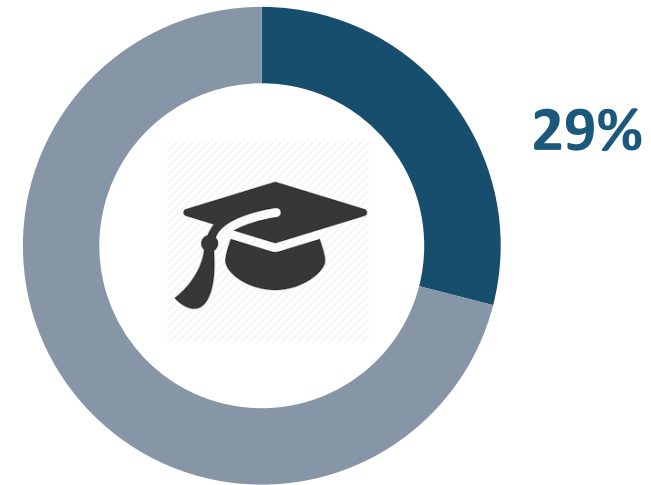

Highlights of Effective CoPs

- Shared domain of interest and commitment to it.
- Belief in the competence of the individuals in the group.
- Practitioners with first hand knowledge of the practice.
- Purposeful to meet new challenges, innovate, and develop strategic directions for expanded impact.*

Principle and Goals of the MSI CoPs

- Connect the CoPs to specialized content expertise and resources.
- Provide networking opportunities for CoP members to share best practices and experiences.
- Build the capacity of CoP members to work together to best serve community college students.

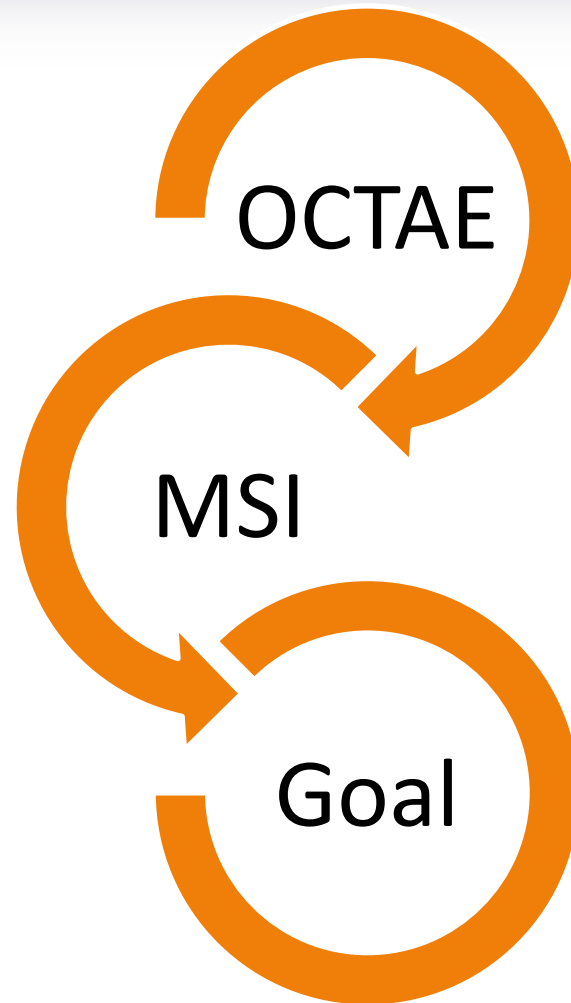
Expected Outcomes of MSI CoPs

- Improved knowledge of U.S. ED and other government resources.
- Improved knowledge of best practices and experiences that serve underrepresented and underserved students.
- Improved service for every student attending an MSI.
- Increase network networking across minority serving community college staff and faculty.
- Sustaining CoPs after TA ends.

Challenges to CoP Success

- Faculty and staff have limited resources and capacity for new efforts.
- CoP members are currently involved in other networks (that can be leveraged or may duplicate new efforts).
- CoP members are *only* interested in networking for a shared purpose or goal.
- Members must see results of their participation and “get something out of it.”

What Are Emerging Topics for MSIs?

Suggested Discussion Items

Importance of Collective Action Now....

- What are the implications for underrepresented students in the new administration?
- How do MSIs educate the new administration on the importance of their programs?
- How do MSIs demonstrate the importance of their programs to building the U.S. workforce to benefit all?
- How can a CoP's collective action sustain current levels of student services?

Considerations in MSI Future Funding....

- How do MSIs continue to meet the needs of students if federal funding gets reduced or eliminated?
- How do MSIs demonstrate to the new administration the value and worth of current federal funding for their programs and students?
- What are the other government or non-government resources for maintaining or expanding funding?

Needed Data Collection and Research....

- *What Works Clearinghouse* is useful; however, not much data is provided on serving minority students. How do we improve this?
- How do we continue to get funding or refocus funding to support data collection and research for MSI goals?
- What expertise do MSIs bring to the education table, and how do we make sure MSIs are at that table?

Moving Forward

- MSI leadership in the CoPs is key to its success.
- Understand OCTAE's continued support through LINC's, organization, and resource support (to minimize time and resource drains).
- Determine primary and targeted focus for emerging issues (suggested here or others).
- Decide if the current CoP structure works to achieve the set goal(s).

Moving Forward (continued)

- Identify who should be a part of the CoP.
- Decide how progress is to be measured and marketed.
- How do we as MSIs work together?
